

Church

Church is the lifeline of any society. UUCC strives to serve as a unique place providing a safe haven for spiritual exploration that instills positive change in people's lives. This momentum is then spread out beyond the walls of the church and incorporated into the community. UUCC sponsors programs and services not provided by any other organization in Hendricks County as well as partners with other organizations on projects.

Making a Difference

UUCC has a 15-year history of transparency and activism within the community. Church members have been instrumental in starting the county park system and involved in a number of community efforts

- The Christmas Day Dinner Providing a hot meal and toys to needy families
- Shared Blessings Cooperative Food Pantry providing food to the needy in Hendricks County
- Keys, Strings and Other Things-a concert series that brings international talent to Hendricks County
- Rally on the Square Supporting our LGBTQ friends and neighbors
- Lion's Den Serving hot meals at St. Mark's Episcopal Church in Plainfield for seniors
- Guest at Your Table Raising money for local and international humanitarian efforts
- Hendricks County Alliance for Diversity (HCAD) Intercultural group of citizens committed to fair and equal treatment of all people. Its mission is to work toward smoothing the way for the increasing ethnic, religious and racial diversity of Hendricks County
- Welcoming Congregation The Welcoming Congregation Program is a volunteer program for Unitarian Universalist congregations that want to take intentional steps to become more welcoming and inclusive of people with marginalized sexual orientations and gender identities.
- Shoe Drive- Collect shoes and distribute at our church to any person in need in Hendricks County
- Underneath it All We are the Same-Underwear and sock collection at the beginning of the school year for distribution to needy people.

Campaign

From backyards to childhood homes, hometowns to first apartments, schools to places of worship, places play a significant role in shaping our relationships, social lives, dreams, spirituality and memories.

For congregations, the church building serves as a symbol of collective identity, a vessel to contain the congregants, a chalice to hold the flame that is the energy of the congregation.

Through the Building on the Side of Love Capital Campaign, UUCC seeks to raise the needed funds to update and improve our current space to enhance the sense of familiarity, hope, appreciation, comfort and peace enjoyed by the congregation and visitors alike while at the same time taking steps to plan for future growth.

Our congregation, on November 24, 2013, voted to move ahead with a joint-purpose capital campaign aimed at addressing building upgrades and repairs with an eye toward growth to \$200,000.



Needs and Opportunities Goal-\$160,000

The funds raised during the 2014 capital campaign will provide a unique opportunity to address immediate needs, while at the same time, planning for the future.

Welcome

We want a building that welcomes the long-time members and makes a warm impression for the first-time visitor. Renovations to the building that can help us with this include providing a safe, easy-to-navigate ADA compliant ramp into the sanctuary, handicap accessible restrooms on the sanctuary and basement levels, a stair lift, and new carpet and ceiling tiles in the social hall and religious education rooms.

Green and Safe

We want to fulfill our Seventh Principle which honors, "respect for the interdependent web of which we are a part." Currently, the HVAC system is in need of upgrading and mold remediation. The lower level windows are nearing the end of their useful life and are not energy efficient. The roof will soon need to be replaced or redesigned. Replacing deteriorating and inefficient structural elements with "greener" options fulfills our mission and is a responsible stewardship practice.

With an Eye To the Future \$200,000 Challenge Goal

After careful consideration, the 2014 Campaign Team of Twelve determined that the \$160,000 goal to be paid over three years is realistic for our congregation. And, with discernment and inspirational giving, we can reach \$200,000.

In the November 24, 2013, vote, we decided the first \$100,000 will be used to make building repairs. Funds raised toward the second \$100,000 will be designated to buy land for expansion.

In April, when we as a congregation know how much money we can raise, we will refine and prioritize the needs in a plan for review. UU Community Church is a wellspring of decency and a beacon of free religion in Central Indiana. As your Interim Minister I am proud of the energy flow-
